

The Hosta 'Fortunei' family

This month we look at the range of varieties linked to *H*. 'Fortunei', focusing on those we hold in our collection. This issue only features the first generation of plants directly attribute to *H*. 'Fortunei', later newsletters will pick up on specific second generation varieties...

Garden stalwarts

The main reason for featuring the *H.* 'Fortunei' branch of the genus was to help readers indentify some the the older varieties they may have in their gardens, whether purchased many years ago, or inherited through house moves. We hold many of the varieties listed as *H.* 'Fortunei types and sports, in our collection - see list in side column. Some of those varieties have been re-named or re-assigned due to further research into their origins. This has created a little confusion over the years because there are some very well-

established named varieties that are so similar to each other. We suspect this has given rise to the comment we hear from older generation gardeners that "all hostas are the same". This may have been an appropriate comment to make around 30 years ago, before micropropagation methods, and

increasing interest from breeders, gave rise to the explosion in new cultivars. It certainly cannot be considered an accurate assessment of the genus today.

Two particular offspring of *H*. 'Fortunei' have been responsible for numerous lookalikes. *H*. 'Fortunei Aureomarginata', with it's yellow margins and *H*.

'Fortunei Albomarginata' with it's white margins. Hosta 'Wayne' is the revised

name for *H*. 'Fortunei Hyacinthina Variegated, and has margins that are more green than yellow, so it hasn't been included in the yellow-margined varieties listed below. The two sections below show the similarities and also feature some second generation varieties:

Threat to plant diversity

The EU has recently announced plans to rationalise 12 directives into a single piece of legislation. Underpinning this move would be a central register of all plants. Only those with a full, filed, description would be legally available for sale. This currently costs hundreds of pounds per plant, which is why only those mass produced will be registered. This will severely limit diversity and effectively destroy the specialist plant industry, not just in the UK.
