Nursery update

This season, after much thought, we have decided to open

For those of you who are unaware, this was the most expensive single cultivar we added to our collection, back in the 1980s. It remains Robin's favourite and I love it for its fabulous stature, wherever I exhibit it. It is a reliable grower and quickly re-establishes when divided. As the cultivar matures the leaves develop more texture, which make them less susceptible to snail

damage and the effects of

adverse weather.

restricted times rather than have an open gate policy.

We need to get a lot of ground work and clearance done around the nursery, which will mean we will be elsewhere, often with noisy machinery, and may not be aware we have visitors. We would hate to miss you but, more importantly, we would like to avoid any risk of you walking into danger trying to find us.

Job of the month: as the days lengthen and the sun has more power (when we see it), the soil will begin to warm up and the pests will surface. Deploy your jars and good luck.

If you decide to mulch you plants this spring, place a jar underneath the mulch as pests will be attracted to the rotting vegetation, and you won't have to look at the jars - <u>click here</u> for more information.

As the season progresses, the leaf centres lighten gradually to a creamy colour whilst the blue-green margins seem to become bolder. Too much sun will hasten the colour change, so lots of dappled shade is good for maintaining the vibrancy of leaf colour for longer.

Although *H.* 'Paul's Glory' can be displayed as a specimen, in isolation, we feel it sings out when planted among other cultivars of similar stature, particularly among 'blueleaved' varieties. If you love the colour and H. 'Paul's Glory' is too large for you to consider in your garden, you could try H. 'Gold Standard' instead, although the leaves are not as textured. Coming down further in size, you could look at H. 'Lucy Vitols' or H. 'Rainforest Sunrise' for great colour and

texture.

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
